Provide leadership and fundraising support for the current capital campaign to complete funding for the new facilities, and for future endowments. Raise funds for annual operations, including increasing membership and grant funding.

Continue implementing strategic plan and report progress to board and staff.

Maintain a strong commitment to the university campus and its education programs.

Oversee the continuation of successful museum offerings and the development of new programs and exhibitions, including new collection-installations in the new and renovated facilities.

Work with and engage a Board of thirty members.

Manage a professional staff of fourteen, and foster a professional and collegial environment.

Oversee high standards for the care, display, and interpretation of important collections and loans.

Develop and monitor the \$1.5M annual budget.

Work with staff and the marketing committee to enhance marketing of the museum as a world-class institution and destination, and on initiatives to enlarge membership and visitation and for the grand opening in 2021.

Partner with staff assigned to the current expansion and renovation project to open the new museum; and oversee the facilities, including the NMM's Carnegie-library 1910 climate-controlled building, where 1,100 representative instruments are exhibited in 9 galleries, a new future 16,000 square-foot addition to the Carnegie building to open in 2021, and a new Preservation Center/storage facility opening in 2019.

Oversee the Master of Music degree program in the History of Musical Instruments (a prestigious program and the only one in the US, from which musical instrument curators at the Metropolitan Museum in NY and the MFA in Boston and other curators have graduated).

Qualifications: Graduate degree in the field of musicology, museum studies, ethnomusicology, arts administration, business or a related field required.

At least three years of experience in museum administration, music administration, or other non-profit organization administration preferred.

Experience with non-profit fundraising for operations and capital, including private-donor development, grant-writing, and membership development giving at a scale appropriate to this museum is preferred.

Communication and people skills to engage the Board, membership, donors, and the public, and to serve as the face of the Museum desirable

Knowledge of new trends in nonprofit administration to engage new, younger audiences and exhibit experience is desirable.

Knowledge of and passion for music history and for rare and historical musical instruments desirable.
