The Design phase is about creating a roadmap to the desired future. This stage translates the visions from the Dream phase into concrete, actionable strategies and initiatives.

Thought-provoking questions for this phase are:

- How can the museum capitalize on its strengths to fulfill these visions?
- What new initiatives or programs would further deepen community engagement?
- What resources are necessary to facilitate these developments?

4. Destiny: Manifest the Dream

In the Destiny phase, the plans are set in motion. The strategies and initiatives designed earlier are now implemented, but this stage is also about reflection, learning, and adaptation, ensuring that the museum is progressing towards its goals.

Reflective questions for this phase include:

- How are the newly introduced initiatives influencing community engagement?
- What successes can the museum celebrate, and what can be learned from them?
- How can the museum modify its strategies based on the feedback receive d?
